It was my privilege on May 10th, to welcome attendees to the first event of the Unionville Home Society Speaker Series. The goal of this new Series is to bring

pre-eminent experts and leaders to speak on a range of topics in the field of health and seniors care. With the sponsorship and support from the Mount Pleasant Group of Cemeteries and from the Marleigh Retirement Residence, UHS was able to bring the renowned ethicist, Dr. Robert Butcher to our community to speak on the changing landscape of end of life care. Dr. Butcher has provided ethics services and ethics education to a wide range of health care facilities and organizations right across the country, has published academic articles and for the last ten years he has designed and delivered Accreditation Canada's ethics education workshops.

Many people don't want to think or talk about their death or dying or they wait until it is too late. This can have serious repercussions such as distress on family members, strain on caregivers and treatments being given to patients/residents that they don't want. As we age and change, new questions arise about personal independence and autonomy and the limits on the things we can expect our care providers to do or not do. I am sure we can all agree that end-of-life care is certainly changing and the new legislation in Canada that will permit medical aid in dying is one example.

Decisions about end-of-life care are deeply personal, and are based on your values and beliefs. Lack of understanding of a person's wishes about their future care may result in a loss of dignity for that person. Talking with your loved ones, your healthcare providers, and even your friends are all important steps to make your wishes known. These conversations will relieve loved ones and healthcare providers of the need to guess what you would want if you are ever facing a healthcare or medical crisis.

Think about it, I know I am.
