Never A Dull Moment Message from our CEO, Debra Cooper Burger

This saying holds true as I reflect on campus happenings over the past several months. Many exciting and positive things have occurred on the campus and the support of our community has been amazing. Significant

donations were made to the Unionville Home Society Foundation since last summer, most notably from the Mayor Scarpitti's Annual Harvest Golf Tournament and the Alex Chui Golf Tournament. We are grateful for being chosen as their selected charity. This fall, The Women's Committee of Markham once again held their annual Fall Fling Fashion show, with record attendance and financial goals exceeded. The proceeds from the event are directed to enhancement of dementia care in both Union Villa and Markhaven Long Term Care homes. The UHS Foundation celebrated another successful "Dinner Party Gala" on November 8th, 2014 and raised over \$100,000 to enhance the home-like environment and resident experiences at the Villa.

Special recognition was received in November when the Unionville Home Society was awarded the City of Markham/ Board of Trade Business Excellence Award for "Accessibility". It was an honour to be recognized for campus innovation and our commitment to accessibility for all. Two issues that continue to be top of mind both at the governance and operational levels of our campus are the need for improvements in funding for long term care and more availability of seniors housing in our community.

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Physically, long term care residents are older, frailer and more chronically ill than ever before. Mental health issues, dementias in particular, have increased significantly and will continue to grow. In fact, 60% of long term care residents suffer from dementia. The challenging behaviours often associated with mental health conditions have become a critical issue directly affecting the safety and well being of residents and staff. Long Term Care homes want to provide better staffing ratios and make improvements in staff training and education but are limited with the current provincial funding levels.

We also know that seniors must have access to a range of safe and affordable housing with the necessary supports to meet their diverse needs. The wait time between applying for Rent Geared to Income assistance and being offered housing for a senior has increased from 2.5 years (2011) to 3.72 years (2013).

As an organization and a campus of care, we are strongly advocating and promoting progress on both these issues.

Adult Day Program Adds pFIT Program



The pFIT mobility strength training for seniors program continues to spread across the Unionville Home Society campus. pFIT started as a York University research study in 2012 to prove the effectiveness of a new resistance device for seniors called the p44 Stepper. After the completion of the study, a Trillium grant helped fund the purchase of 8 p44 Steppers so the pFIT program could continue for members of the Unionville Community Centre for Seniors. And now pFIT is available for clients of the Adult Day Program.

"Our Adult Day Program strives to offer quality therapeutic programming and so we are embracing opportunities such as pFIT to show families and caregivers that we are always looking at ways to maintain and/or improve client ability," shares Kate Papillo, Manager. "In October, we ran a 4 week pFIT pilot and the results spoke for themselves—all 16 of the participants showed measurable leg strength improvement."

"We are pleased to be able to offer more members of UHS the benefits of our pFIT program," says pFIT instructor Andrew Coates. "We run pFIT in many other retirement residences and seniors centres across the GTA, but this is the first adult day program.

A Resident Focused Team



My first three months at Unionville Home Society have been a flurry of activity with an initial analysis of what we're doing well, and where we have opportunities to improve. I have spent considerable time building our Unionville Home Society Leadership Team with new people that bring a great deal of Long-Term Care (LTC) experience, as well as the passion and caring that are vital to a person centered approach.

In October, our interim Director of Nursing and Personal Care, Fran Lind, completed her term to take on a new opportunity. After a long search for a suitable and permanent replacement, we were happy to announce the appointment of Jacqueline Tudor. Jacqueline has performed this role in a number of LTC homes, most recently Winbourne Park in Ajax, and now, she brings her extensive Nursing Administration experience to Union Villa. Throughout her career, she has demonstrated strong leadership skills, and is well versed in quality improvement initiatives, as well as the accreditation process. Jacqueline is a strong proponent of a respectful workplace where person centered care is a top priority. Shortly after I arrived, I met with Peter Yeung, our Manager of Environmental Services to discuss a long-term plan to ensure the environmental needs of the campus are being met. We decided we would be well served to incorporate an Environmental Supervisor into the team who would be dedicated to overseeing this function specifically for Union Villa. In November, John McLaughlin was hired as Supervisor, Environmental Support Services at Union Villa. John brings with him a wealth of experience he's accumulated over nineteen years in building maintenance, and close to ten years experience in Long-term Care. John is well versed in quality improvement procedures, quality audits, and health and safety.

In early December, we added Laurie Porter to our Leadership Team in the role of Supervisor, Recreation and Social Activities. The addition of this position will enhance the Recreation staff members ability to focus on direct programming enriching the experience of our residents. Laurie is a Certified Recreation Therapist, and her most recent position saw her managing a Recreation department in an LTC home similar in size to Union Villa.

Transitioning into a new role can sometimes be daunting, but I have felt so welcomed. I would like to personally take this opportunity to thank all the residents, families and staff for such a warm reception.
