

SEPTEMBER DAYS OF SIGNIFICANCE

This is a new section in the Villa Vibe to inform our residents about special days of significance each month. Acknowledging and celebrating these days supports a sense of community through inclusion.

LABOUR DAY - September 6

Labour *Day* Labour day began in time when worker rights were taken for granted. On March 25, 1872 Toronto workers went on strike, nearly one tenth of the city's population joined in solidarity to show support for the working class. In 1894, under mounting pressure from the working class, Prime Minister Sir John Thompson declared Labour Day a national holiday. Labour Day has evolved so much over time, now resulting in families spending much needed time together.

GRANDPARENTS DAY - September 11



The origin of Grandparents' Day dates back to 1970 when Marian MacQuade started a campaign for Grandparents' Day to become a national day. McQuade worked towards raising awareness about senior citizens and the contributions they have made throughout history as well as encouraged the youth to 'adopt' a grandparent for a specific duration of time.

NAVARATRI - September 26



Navratri, (Sanskrit: "nine nights") in full Sharad Navratri; Navratri also spelled Navaratri; also called Durga Puja, in Hinduism, major festival held in honour of the divine feminine. Navratri occurs over 9 days during the month of Ashvin, or Ashvina (in the Gregorian calendar, usually September–October). This year it falls on Monday September 26th.

ROSH HASNAHAH - September 25-26



Rosh Hashanah is a special festival which celebrates Jewish New Year. It literally means 'head of the year' or 'first of the year'. Its one of the holiest days. The festival begins on the first day of Tishrei, the seventh month of the Hebrew calendar, which falls during September or October .The festival lasts for two days and this year it starts on Monday 26 September.

NATIONAL DAY OF TRUTH AND RECONCILIATION - September 30



National Truth and Reconciliation Day is a day when we honour the Indigenous children who were sent away to Residential Schools in Canada and learn more about the history of these schools. It has become a National Campaign to raise awareness and provide education about Residential Schools in Canada.
